At St Mary's, we have a strong commitment to parental involvement and see homework as one way of developing this partnership. Homework is important since it reinforces and extends the teaching and learning that occurs during the day. Homework encourages parental involvement in children's learning and helps to develop independence. It is important however to remember and make it known to parents, that when a child has worked for a full day in school he/she may not respond positively to having large amounts of homework. It is beneficial for children, where possible, to have a quiet undisturbed environment in which to complete their homework.

Our aims of providing homework are to:

- Ensure a consistency of approach throughout the school
- Ensure progression towards independence and an individual responsibility
- Ensure the needs of the individual are taken into account
- Ensure that parents/carers understand our expectations of children
- Improve the quality of learning experiences offered to the children
- Extend and support learning
- Provide opportunities for parents, children and the school to work in partnership
- Provide opportunities for children and parents to share learning experiences
- Encourage children to develop long term strategies for future needs
- Prepare Year Six children for the secondary phase of education

For children to make the most progress, reading, spelling and multiplication/ division facts need to be practised nightly. The times are a guide and an approximate indication of how long a child should spend working on their homework. Children should be encouraged to discuss any problems they are having with their teacher. It is not acceptable for children to struggle excessively, causing upset at home. Parents/carers are encouraged to liaise with the class teacher if any concerns arise.

In some cases, children may require extra homework tasks to reinforce concepts or to provide support in certain areas.

Homework will:

- Increase as children get older
- Be interesting and relevant to the class work
- Be encouraged by a positive approach
- Be marked
- Not necessarily be written work

Following these guidelines will help children to develop independence, realise their full potential and prepare them for the next stage in their education.
